

Spay Today...No Excuses!

Each year, millions of cats, dogs, kittens, and puppies are dropped off at animal shelters. Why are there so many homeless animals? A major reason is that many pets are not **spayed** or **neutered**.

Spaying and neutering are operations that prevent pets from having babies. Female animals are spayed; males are

neutered. The operations take only a short time in a veterinarian's office, and pets recover quickly.

Some veterinarians and animal shelters offer free or low-cost spaying and neutering. If you can't afford to spay or neuter your pet, how will you afford to raise her kittens or puppies?

Even if you find homes for your pet's babies, couldn't those homes have gone to cats and dogs in shelters instead?

Most people are surprised at how soon their pets can get pregnant. Vets agree that kittens and puppies can be spayed early, as young as 8 to 14 weeks of age.

Spaying and neutering are good for your pets' health. The operations reduce or eliminate pets' chances of getting certain kinds of cancer and other diseases. They can also make pets less likely to bite or run away from home.

Mistakes happen even in the most careful households. Doors or windows can be left open and—oopsy, Daisy!—pets can accidentally get outside. Don't take a chance; spay today.
